Structure, Governance and Management

Biggleswade Scout Group is a registered charity, governed by our Constitution, Declaration of Trust made on 17 April 1962 and also the Policy, Organisation and Rules of the Scout Association UK (January 2015).

The Group Council is the electoral body, which supports Scouting in the Scout Group. It is the body to which the Group Executive Committee is accountable. The Group Council consists of all adult volunteers and supporters, along with the parents of all youth members.

The Group is managed by an Executive Committee (the Charity Trustees) who are appointed and elected from the Group Council. It is their responsibility to support the Group Scout Leader in meeting the responsibilities of their appointment. This includes maintenance of the Group's property and equipment, raising funds and managing the Group's finances, insurance of persons, property and equipment and assisting with recruitment of leaders and other adult support. All new trustees undergo training mandated by the Scout Association.

The trustees regularly consider major risks and are currently undertaking a project to help secure a new home for Scouting in Biggleswade to ensure we have adequate facilities for the next 20-30 years.

The Group is part of the Scout Association UK and as such is guided and supported by the local Scouting District, and by teams at the Scout Associations national headquarters.

As a registered charity the trustees also give due consideration to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission.

Objectives and Activities

Our Charitable Objectives are to contribute to the development of young people in achieving their full physical, intellectual, social and spiritual potentials as individuals, as responsible citizens, and as members of their local, national and international communities.

The Group meets the Charity Commission's public benefit criteria under both the advancement of education and the advancement of citizenship or community development headings.

Membership this year is up slightly at 239 members.

Biggleswade Scout Group currently runs 3 Beaver Colonies, 3 Cub

Packs, 2 Scout Troops and in partnership with Biggleswade and District 1 Explorer Unit. Between them these provide a programme of personal development for nearly 200 young people aged between 6 and 18 years old who live in and around the market town of Biggleswade in Bedfordshire.

This programme consists of a weekly meeting during term time, a number of day trips and the opportunity to take part in residential experiences. The programme is based around three themes: -

- Outdoors and Adventure
- World
- Skills

The Scout Group is run entirely by volunteers.

Achievements and Performance

Scouting continues to be very popular in Biggleswade with all sections running near their capacity. We have an active Beaver waiting list and currently have up to 19 people who are old enough to start but are waiting for places at one of our Beaver Colonies. We also have over 90 people on the waiting list who are not yet old enough to start.

Through our sections we have successfully delivered a programme of personal development consisting of over 50 hours of activities to over 200 young people—this is over 10,000 hours of personal development for young people in the local area. We know that our young people are engaging and benefiting from this development by a significant number of Chief Scouts Awards that have been presented this year—the highest recognition of a young persons achievement in each section.

The Group have maintained their profile in the local community by taking part in parades to mark St George's Day and Remembrance day and having representatives at other events like the Mayor's Annual Civic Service.

We continued our relationship with the Developers of the Kings Reach estate this year by holding an event for the official opening of Baden Powell Way to mark the completion of the new road on 27 June 2015.

The Scout Group had its most successful year in Biggleswade Carnival. Our Charlie and the Chocolate Factory themed float won first place. The Beavers and Cubs enjoyed dressing up as Oompa Loompa's and the adults played the parts of many of the other characters in the story including Mr Willy Wonka. The float was designed and built by Michelle Chappell and John Higgins assisted by a team of other

volunteers.

One of the greatest achievements this year was the Biggleswade Scout and Guide Gangshow 2016. The Scout Group comes together with a number of local Brownie and Guide units to put on a Gangshow. In 2016 we did 2 shows to sell out audiences at Stratton Upper School on Saturday 19 March 2016. This was Nick Gurney's last year as producer and we thank Nick for all of his hard work over many years.

Biggleswade is growing—with a significant new housing development on the east side of the town. School intakes within the town are increasing with expansions of existing schools and the addition of new schools. This growth represents a significant challenge for an already large Scout Group and we need to ensure we are ready to meet this challenge in the coming years.

Notes to the Accounts

For Financial Year ended on 31 March 2016

This was another successful year for the Group. While membership is down slightly on last year—due mainly to falling Cub numbers—and this has resulted in lower income. We have also seen a similar reduction in expenditure. This has resulted in a small surplus and a healthy balance at the end of the year.

Receipts

Membership subscriptions – the main source of income for the Group. Down slightly due to falling numbers in Cubs.

Residential Experiences, Trips and Activities – Additional money collected from the members for the purposes of paying for specific camps, trips and activities. Usually these take the form of day or weekend activities.

Bank Interest – interest earned in all of the Scout Group accounts.

Fundraising – Shows the income generated through fund raising activities. This year this was mainly donations to the Group from the Retreat (£500), Biggleswade Carnival (£150), the Biggleswade Calendar (£550) and M V Kelly (£385).

Gift Aid – As a registered charity we are able to claim Gift Aid on donations and our membership subscriptions qualify as a donation for these purposes. During 2015/16 we completed the 2013/14 claim.

Other—other income—this consisted mainly of a refund from Eon of funds held on account for the utilities at the Scout Headquarters.

Payments

Scout Association Capitation – Annual payment made to the Scout Association based on the number of members within the Group. For 2015/16 this was £ 6,699.50 whi ch is less that it was in 2014/15 due a change in the way that Capitation is calculated and slightly lower membership numbers.

Residential Experiences, Trips and Activities – Money spent on providing specific camps, trips and activities for our members.

Fundraising Costs – costs incurred in the course of raising funds.

Headquarters Utilities – Expenditure on Electricity, Gas, Water and Refuse collections for the Scout Group Headquarters.

Headquarters – Maintenance and Cleaning – costs incurred in maintaining the Groups Headquarters and its grounds, including capital expenditure.

Events – This shows the total expenditure for any group events.

Leader Uniform – cost of uniform for the Group's volunteers.

Insurance – Costs of providing insurance for the Scout Group HQ and all camping and disco equipment owned by the Scout Group.

Rent – cost to the Group of renting rooms at Trinity Methodist Church to accommodate Neptune Cub Pack. This also included £115 that was still owing to St Andrews Church following us use in Autumn 2014.

Equipment – Capital expenditure on group equipment.

Resources (including badges) – Resource items purchased for use e.g. paper, glue, paint etc. We saw a significant increase in the amount spent on resources during this year – particularly in Gemini Beavers, Mercury Beavers and Armstrong Scouts.

Volunteer expenses – costs incurred by volunteers in the course of their volunteer work which are reimbursed to them.

Donations - donations made by the Group.

Bank Charges and Professional Fees – costs incurred as a result of running bank accounts, legal fees, and fees incurred in relation to the independent examination of the annual accounts.

Assets

Bank Current Accounts—includes the Groups central Current accounts as well as the individual section current accounts.

Bank Deposit Accounts — Includes the Group Savings accounts and a very small amount in a Neptune Cub Pack savings account.

COIF Savings Accounts — are two investment accounts managed by CCLA in their COIF Investment Fund (An "all in one" diversified long-term fund designed for charities.).

In addition to the cash assets, the Group owns the HQ building along with the land and a considerable quantity of camping equipment. These have not been formally valued and so are not included in the accounts.

Liabilities

As at 31 March 2016, the Scout Group had no liabilities.

Furthermore as Nick has stepped down from his current role in Gang Show there is a need to get a larger team together and spread the workload amongst them for the next show. We also think it would be helpful if the team developed some of the acts needed as some of the gangs find it harder to put an act together than others.

Fundraising Committee

Last year we saw the departure of our current fundraising team members. In the near future we hope to resurrect the Committee and welcome anyone who is interested in joining the team or who has some fundraising ideas. We are a small group who hold informal meetings about six times a year.

This year we have focused our attention on Gift Aid. We would encourage all parents who are UK tax payers to sign a Gift Aid declaration so that we can reclaim back 25p for every £1 paid in subs.

This year we are looking to claim back £2560 which is a tremendous amount however 34% of our parents had not completed a form meaning we are unable to claim back a further £1305. This year we have also been lucky enough to receive two grants. We accepted £150 from Biggleswade Carnival Committee who we support each year on carnival day and help to deliver the carnival programmes. We also made an application to Biggleswade Town Council for £300. We decided the money would be used to help the cubs celebrate their centenary, paying for commemoration badges for all cubs and contributing to a series of activities and events during their 100th year.

We received over 400 Cashpoints from the Biggleswade Chronicle and await final donation. Thank you to everyone who collected. We continue to collect used ink cartridges using Recycle4Charity. Thank

you to everyone who collected over 8000 Sainsbury's Active Kids Vouchers. We have been able to purchase sports equipment and cooking utensils.

Mercury Beaver Colony

Mercury Beavers had another fantastic year. We continued to be a success as the third beaver colony in Biggleswade, maintaining the record of a full quota of 24 beavers since opening over two years ago.

Whilst the colony is still run with a sole warranted leader, three parents stepped up to become Occasional Helpers in 2015 whilst our efforts to recruit an assistant leader continued. Mercury Beavers was (and continues to be) run with a parent rota in place so that we have at least two parent helpers on hut nights, and four when out and about. Our culture of welcoming siblings of helpers, combined with our earlier start time of 5pm, has meant our group continues to run successfully (with the waiting list bolstered by little ones that can't wait to be an official beavers now they've seen what their big sister/brother gets up to on a Friday night!).

With the introduction of the new badges and badge criteria in Beavers in September 2015 we have been working on these new topics over the year. We have awarded 394 badges in this accounts period. Three of our beavers were awarded the Chief Scout Bronze award this year under the old criteria and have now started on their second bronze under the new criteria. We have awarded badges in Cycling, Swimming, Cooking, Navigator, Teamwork and Personal Challenges to list but a few in our diverse and balanced programme.

We held two joint sleepovers with Apollo Beavers again this year with the themes "How To Train Your Dragon camp" and "Minions" in March and December 2015 respectively. We also held a Mercury only summer sleepover at Bromham in June 2015. One of our beavers was awarded 4 nights away which is rare (most beavers will only achieve 2 nights away whilst they are in Beavers).

Mercury was also active within the community by taking part in the St. Georges Day parade and service, District Teddy Bears picnic, Biggleswade Carnival, opening of Baden Powell Way, Millennium tree planting, Green Wheel bulb planting, St Andrew's Church fete and the Remembrance Day Parade.
